## Dear Reader,

We started our journey of analysing legislative big-data in the European Parliament last year with the release of our first annual report. Encouraged by its favourable reception and increased interest in our work since its publication, we are now proud to present its successor, the Eulytix Annual Report, European Parliament 2020-2021.

This report serves a threefold purpose and has multiple applications. First, it gives all EU citizens an overview on the legislative activities of the Members of the European Parliament (MEPs). Second, our report helps lobbyist and public affairs companies improve their lobbying and communication strategies by identifying key MEPs in a certain EP Group or policy area. Third, it gives MEPs, national delegations, and EP Groups new avenues to enhance their legislative influence by analysing their legislative performance as well as the performance of their political allies and opponents.

The report is based on the legislative amendments tabled by the MEPs in the various committees during the second year of the current EP term, from June 2020 to August 2021. This report is the product of the analysis of hundreds of thousands of data points on the legislative processes in the EP with the use of techniques from social network analysis.

In this report MEPs are ranked along three principal dimensions: the activity ranking consists of the most active MEPs, the connectivity ranking highlights the most embedded MEPs, and the ideological heterogeneity ranking reveals the capacities of certain MEPs to act as bridges between different segments of the ideological spectrum.

Since last year, we have further developed our methodology, in part responding to feedback from last year. Specifically, the connectivity and ideological heterogeneity rankings have been improved to better reflect the underlying intuitions by the removal of bridging related indicators from connectivity and the inclusion of their generalisations in ideological heterogeneity. In addition to these revisions, we now include a definitive list of top MEPs based on rankings in the three principal domains of investigation - activity, connectivity, and ideological heterogeneity - using the

Kemény-Young method, a type of Condorcet method. The identification of the most impactful MEPs - those who are the most efficient at altering legislative acts by tabling amendments - is also possible. The list of the most impactful MEPs and an analysis of those findings are available on demand.

Like in last year's report, we present the legislative activities of individual MEPs by EP Committee, EP Group and Member State. The report thus contains 5 main chapters. First, we briefly introduce the underlying methodology in Chapter 1. Then, Chapter 2 presents the top 50 MEPs regarding each dimension. The following Chapter 3, 4 and 5 contain the results by EP Committee, EP Group and Member State, respectively.

## 1. Data & methodology

This chapter serves the purpose of elaborating the methodological foundations of the rankings published in this report. First, the input dataset is introduced. Then, we outline the methodological principles of the various rankings: activity, connectivity, and ideological heterogeneity.

Unlike other reports on the European Parliament, this work relies on the cosponsorship network of the Members of the European Parliament using data from the 9th EP term. We use a novel database of amendments tabled in the EP and several other related variables. The amendments in the dataset are extracted from the official documents available in the EP's website. In this report we used 93,517 amendments tabled to 291 legislative dossiers.

We connect MEPs based on their mutual sponsorship of legislative amendments. By construction, the strength of the ties between MEPs depends on the number of total amendments tabled. It is known intuitively that stronger bonds might form during an activity if the number of participants is low, hence we also consider the number of MEPs participating in the tabling of each amendment. The more sponsors an amendment has, the less its contribution to the social ties between the MEPs involved. The result is a network that not only represents the existence of ties between MEPs, but also their strength.

We construct a measure of MEPs' legislative activity based on the number of amendments they tabled in the legislative procedures. As it is highly probable that MEPs distribute the effort while wording cosponsored amendments, we also consider the number of MEPs contributing to each amendment tabled. The result is such a quantity, which captures the legislative activities of MEPs. We then rank MEPs along this dimension, in various thematic sections such as Member States, EP Groups or EP Committees.

The connectivity, the position of the MEPs in the network is also investigated. We employ a multi-dimensional approach to assess MEPs' importance in the legislative arena. The dimensions along which MEPs' "connectedness" is investigated are the number and strength of their connections, the number of MEPs they can reach and the average distance to them and finally, the well-connectedness of their direct partners. A partial ranking along each of these dimensions is created then aggregated using the Kemény-Young method, treating each dimension with equal weight, establishing the conclusive hierarchy of MEPs regarding their well-connectedness.

As the ideological heterogeneity of one's legislative partners is often thought of as a measure of readiness to compromise – an important factor in coalition building – we also investigate the openness of MEPs to form ties with ideologically different partners. The first dimension considered in this regard is the ideological diversity of MEPs' partners measured as the average absolute ideological distance between MEPs and their connections. The ideological distance between MEPs is measured as the distance between them on the plane set by the traditional left–right and pro-EU-anti-EU scales. The ideological features of MEPs are assumed to be the same as their national parties'. These were obtained from the results of the 2019 Chapel Hill Expert Survey. The second dimension incorporates the number of colleagues from other political groups an MEP can reach, and their average distance to them. The last one counts in how many cases does an MEP lie on the shortest path between fellows from their EP group and colleagues from other EP groups. This dimension highlights MEPs that act as bridges to EP groups other than their own. The final ranking of MEPs regarding their ideological heterogeneity is created using the same preference aggregation method as outlined in the case of connectivity.

The final, comprehensive ranking of MEPs is created by taking into account each of the three rankings, namely activity, connectivity and ideological heterogeneity, assigning equal importance to them.

For the rankings of MEPs on Committee level, subnetworks corresponding to the Committee in question are used. The rankings of EP Groups and Member States in Chapters 5 and 6 are established by partial rankings of EP Groups and Member States based on average centralities, aggregated with the Kemény-Young method. For more information on networks, centrality measures and the Kemény-Young method, we refer the Reader to the bibliography in Chapter 7 of this report.

# **Key Findings**

In the second year of the 9th EP term 71 distinct MEPs from 16 Member States tabled 763 amendments in the Constitutional Affairs (AFCO) Committee. Out of these, 371 were cosponsored by two or more MEPs.

AFCO Committee MEPs tabled most of their amendments to INI procedures (608), followed by REG (45).

The most amended dossier was "Strengthening transparency and integrity in the EU institutions by setting up an independent EU ethics

The EP Group affiliations had comparatively moderate influence on the

cosponsoring behavior of MEPs. The AFCO takes the 14th position in the Committee ranking regarding the influence of group affiliation on cosponsoring behavior.

The most active MEP of the Committee was Daniel Freund (Greens/


The most connected MEP of the Committee was Paulo Rangel (EPP). who cosponsored 118 amendments with 19 partners.

Helmut Scholz (GUE/NGL) had the most diverse set of cosponsoring partnerships, sponsoring 74 amendments with 18 distinct partners from 6 EP Groups.

The most active coordinator was Domènec Ruiz Devesa (S&D), the heterogeneous was Geert Bourgeois (ECR).

# **Key Findings**

In the second year of the 9th EP term 232 distinct MEPs from 26 Member States tabled 10,875 amendments in the Foreign Affairs (AFET) Committee. Out of these, 5,135 were cosponsored by two or more

AFET Committee MEPs tabled most of their amendments to INI procedures (10,276), followed by INL (255).

The most amended dossier was "Report on the 2019-2020 Commisthe World 2019 and the European Union's policy on the matter".

The EP Group affiliations had comparatively moderate influence on the cosponsoring behavior of MEPs. The AFET takes the 12th position in the Committee ranking regarding the influence of group affiliation on cosponsoring behavior.

The most active MEP of the Committee was Fabio Massimo Castaldo (NI), who cosponsored 357 amendments with 28 distinct cosponsors.

The most connected MEP of the Committee was Petras Auštrevičius (RE), who cosponsored 1074 amendments with 67 partners.

Andrius Kubilius (EPP) had the most diverse set of cosponsoring partnerships, sponsoring 225 amendments with 19 distinct partners from 4

The most active and ideologically most heterogeneous coordinator was Anna Fotyga (ECR), while the most connected was Hilde Vaut-












